**COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course is a study of word origin and structure through the introduction of prefixes, suffixes, root words, plurals, abbreviations, and symbols, surgical procedures, medical specialties and diagnostic procedures.

**STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES**

At the completion of the semester students will:
1. Describe how medical terms are created.
2. Use basic medical suffixes and prefixes accurately.
3. Define directional terms and anatomic planes of the body.
4. Identify selected body systems, structures, and their related word parts.
5. Use system word parts, prefixes, and suffixes to build and define words.
6. Define medical terms related to selected diseases.
7. Define selected diagnostic and surgical procedural terms for each body system.
8. Define other selected medical terms and related medical specialties.

9. Recognize selected abbreviations related to each body system.
10. Spell and use specific medical terms.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Interpret the meaning of medical terms used in written and verbal communication.</li> </ul>

**TEXT AND MATERIALS**

TexBook Program: This course is in the SPC TexBook program, so you do not need to purchase a textbook or access code for this course.

What is TexBook? The required textbook/digital content for this course is available to you in Blackboard from the first day of class. The fee for the textbook/digital content is the lowest price available from the publisher and bookstore and is included in your tuition/fee payment.

How do I access my TexBook? Your course material is in your Blackboard course from the first day of class. Access to your course material is provided either by RedShelf or other links inside your Blackboard course. RedShelf (and many publisher's) ebook features include the ability to hear the text read aloud, highlight, take notes, create flash cards, see word definitions, build study guides, print select pages, and download up to 20% of the book for offline access.

## **ATTENDANCE POLICY (\*READ CAREFULLY)**

### **Class Attendance**

Students are expected to attend all classes in order to be successful in a course. The student may be administratively withdrawn from the course when absences become excessive as defined in the course syllabus.

When an unavoidable reason for class absence arises, such as illness, an official trip authorized by the college or an official activity, the instructor may permit the student to make up work missed. It is the student's responsibility to complete work missed within a reasonable period of time as determined by the instructor. Even though this is an online class, students still have to access the course on a regular basis. The Blackboard software used to manage this online course tracks student logins, tracking when and where the student has been in the course and number of messages sent and opened. You will feel more at ease with the materials if you stay in touch with what is going on. If you fail to log into the course on a regular basis, I will drop you from the course.
